DR. JEREMY McBAIN teaches applied trumpet, brass chamber music, brass methods and arranging at the University of Texas at Tyler. Prior to his appointment, he taught at Eastern Illinois University, Millikin University (IL), and Saint Mary's College (IN). McBain is also active as a freelance trumpeter in Northeast Texas. He joined the Texarkana Symphony as principal trumpet in fall the 2016 and is a regular member of the Rose City Brass Quintet and Rose City Jazz Orchestra. McBain has also performed with the Bach Society of Houston, East Texas Symphony, Longview Symphony, Baroque Artists of Champaign (IL), Michigan Chamber Brass, and the State Symphony Orchestra of Mexico. He has had the honor of backing up artists such as Doc Severinsen, Byron Stripling, John Clayton, The Contours, and the late Michael Brecker.

McBain was granted the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Illinois in 2012. His doctoral thesis is entitled: "The Role of the Cornet à Pistons in the Early Symphonic Works of Hector Berlioz," which he presented most recently at the 2016 International Trumpet Guild Conference in Anaheim. McBain earned his Master of Music and Bachelor of Arts in Music from the University of Michigan and the University of Houston. Outside of performing and teaching, McBain enjoys time biking and hiking with his wife Katie and two boys Malcolm and Colin.

DR. CAMERON ROSE is the Director of Choral Activities at The University of Texas at Tyler, where he conducts the Patriot Singers and Concert Chorale. Both ensembles perform a vibrant and challenging repertoire from sacred Renaissance works, to orchestral/choral masterworks, to contemporary vocal jazz.

Outside of the university, Dr. Rose is Music Director of CANTORI - Choral Artists of East Texas, an auditioned regional ensemble of 40 singers. He also currently serves as the Chancel Choir Director at First Christian Church in Tyler, Music Director-Organist at St. Francis Episcopal Church in Tyler, and is a frequent organizer/conductor of the East Texas Symphony Chorus.

As a composer, Dr. Rose's works have been performed by numerous ensembles and soloists, including the Tabernacle Choir and Orchestra at Temple Square, and Leticia Oaks Strong, Los Angeles Philharmonic violist. His music has also served as scores for award-winning media projects and the 2002 Salt Lake Winter Olympics. He is an accomplished pianist, including performance as the youngest of 84 "Rhapsody in Blue" pianists as part of the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics Opening Ceremonies. His musical experiences span classical orchestral to jazz piano, from media scoring to gospel, and from the electronic studio to the sacred choral tradition. His degrees in composition and conducting are from the University of Utah, University of Southern California, University of Minnesota, and Brigham Young University.
